# It's a pivotal moment for America and the world



<u>In this article</u> Senator Bernie Sanders reminds us of four pivotal moments in our history, and explains why this November's election is an equally momentous time for America. The historic moments:

**1776:** American colonies freed themselves from British control and declared independence.

**1861**: Civil war broke out in the United States and over 600,000 people died and slavery was abolished.

**1929**: Wall Street collapsed. The United States and much of the world experienced the Great Depression. Unemployment rose to 25% and millions of Americans descended into economic desperation. In 1932, Franklin Delano Roosevelt was elected president and the federal government's role in addressing the needs of working people was transformed.

**1941**: Japan attacked Pearl Harbor and an unprepared United States was forced to mobilize and fight a world war on two fronts: Hitler in Europe and Japan in Asia.

"Today, in 2024," Sanders writes, "our country once again faces a pivotal moment in American history. The crises facing us are enormous. The consequences if we fail are unthinkable." He highlights the climate crisis, wealth inequality, money in politics, AI, and basic human rights. Here is the full article.

## A house divided . . .

**In 1858 Abraham Lincoln** described how America had moved away from freedom toward tyranny in his famous



"House Divided" speech. The essence of his view of America at the time was of a house built with weak and rotten timbers on the one hand, and strong and healthy ones on the other.

**How this is relevant today** is discussed in two recent posts by Jay Kuo and Heather Cox Richardson. Kuo asks, "What kind of house is the GOP building?" He observes, "Today, we again

see framed timbers of different workmen, from the dictator wannabe ex-president, to the corrupt radicals on the Supreme Court, to the extremist MAGA legislators in Congress and state houses. . . The evidence [for the kind of house they the GOP wants to erect] is now clear: They want a return to patriarchal white Christian rule, and to block our long journey toward a multi-racial, egalitarian, secular society." It is also a group that I find doing extraordinary and risky work in the world to help people who are most in need due to displacement and war. Here is their <u>early June newsletter</u> describing their work all over the world, serving 400 million meals "and counting."



#### Buy back your lawn?

In a program designed to save water Washington County in Southern Utah will pay you to transform your lawn into native, drought-tolerant plants. They're projecting that by the end of 2024, their program participants will have transformed enough nonfunctional lawn to be equivalent to a roll of sod about 280 miles long. Collectively, these projects should reach 100 million gallons in annual savings by year's end. That is enough water to supply 520 single family households. Read more.

In a landmark agreement, a Chilean businessman has agreed to sell his 325,000-acre property to the environmentalists who fought against his development plans. The \$63 million sale will preserve some of the most ecologically significant territory in South America, including forests of ancient Alerce trees and the Cochamó Valley, a cathedral of towering granite walls. #### **Restoration Projects**

The EPA has announced new funding to redevelop 200 industrial sites across the country, and an additional \$14 million will be invested into a job training program. The redevelopments will improve air, water, and soil quality and add tens of millions of dollars in local tax revenues. Many of you have likely been to Buchart Gardens in Canada, a former limestone quarry transformed into an incredible garden. Let's hope this happens in the US now as well. Read here.
